Each year one of our most important duties as your elected



officials is to prepare and implement the annual municipal budget. The chart below helps to demonstrate where your tax dollars are being spent. It is our goal to pro-

vide high-level services at a price we can afford. We are proud to report that the quality services you have come accustomed to will not be at all changed by this year's budget, although there will be a small increase in this year's tax rate.

The Water and Sewer rates are stable for the tenth consecutive year. There will be no increase again this year. For your convenience, both our water and sewer reading and billing has been housed in Town Hall for three

years. Since we have returned this service to an in-house operation, our water and sewer billing has become more reliable and efficient. In addition, the department is much more accessible to our residents now that it is located in Town Hall.

We are proud of the municipal employees who have helped to maintain our affordable water and sewer rates.

We are excited to inform our residents that plans for the West Belmar Gateway Project are continuing to take form. The redevelopment area, located on the Route 71 corridor between the Borough of Spring Lake Heights and the Borough of Belmar borders, is the perfect location for the construction of a neighborhood-oriented commercial site. The redevelopment plan requires all retail stores and offices to follow a unified Colonial design theme. Construction on this location is hoped to start next spring.

Due to a generous donation from a local family our Police Department vehicle fleet is now equipped with six Medtronic Lifepak 500 defibrillators. All of our Wall Township officers are CPR and defibrillator trained and certified to insure quality care in the time of an emergency. In addition, the Police Department also has been able to acquire a 16 foot enclosed trailer to house the department's two four wheel drive "Quad" vehicles. This trailer, funded entirely by grant money, provides the Police Department with the ability for more rapid response and deployment in

circumstances where every minute is critical. The growing amount of public open space makes these vehicles even more important.

Plans are starting to come to fruition at the Camp Evans site. As of February, 2004, more than 90 acres of land at Camp Evans has become official property of Wall Township. Our township officials and many Wall resident volunteers are working hard to devise a plan to insure the camp is clean and ready for public use. The long-term objective of the project is to construct a science center to educate children about historic Camp Evans and to provide for active and passive recreational opportunities.

The Township Open Space inventory continues to grow not only with the acquisition of camp Evans, but also with purchases and donations of land. Our Open Space Program will provide future generations with valuable recreational resources. We have included in this issue a list of our Open Space inventory. All of the properties are there for your enjoyment. We look forward to adding even more properties in 2004.

To find out what is happening in other township departments including Recreation, the Youth Center and the Library, please refer to the remaining portion of the Newsletter. As your elected officials, we hope this Newsletter is yet another tool that adds to the quality of service you receive from Wall Township.

As always, we are proud to represent the township community. Our goal is to address your needs and to continue to make Wall Township one of the best places to live in the state of New Jersey.

HOUSE NUMBER NOTICE

Township officials would like to remind Wall residents that all buildings and dwellings must be equipped with visible house numbers. The numbers must be a minimum of three inches in height and must be securely displayed on the front of the building near the main entrance.

Recently, there have been several incidents when the township's emergency services (Fire, First Aid and Police) could not locate an address during a time of crisis. To help our emergency services clearly identify your home, we urge you to purchase and install house numbers conforming to the regulations stated above. Residents and owners who do not comply with these specifications may be subject to a fine imposed at the discretion of the Municipal Court.

LAND USE OFFICE

In New Jersey, the major responsibility for land-use control rests with municipalities.

The Municipal Land Use Law (MLUL) established a three-step process for land development: the development of a master plan, the establishment of development regulations (zoning, subdivision and site plan ordinances), and the development review process (Planning Board and Board of Adjustment review at public meetings).

Since 1975, the MLUL has undergone many revisions as the state Legislature clarified which powers each board exercises and where their powers overlap.

Basically, the Planning Board is the board of "permitted activities." That is to say the Planning Board's essential duties are to develop the Master Plan and implement the policies of the plan through site plan and subdivision ordinances. These ordinances establish a series of ground rules that applicants must meet.

The Board of Adjustment could be referred to as the "board of non-permitted uses" in that it reviews variances from and interpretations of the Zoning Ordinance, which establishes the specific requirements for a given land area within a municipality. In addition to the permitted uses in an area, the zoning ordinance determines the size of land parcels, required setbacks, parking, signs, conditional uses and the numerous other such regulations.

The Land Use Office is responsible for reviewing any proposed development activity and determining whether a permit can be issued directly or must be reviewed first by either the zoning or planning board. If further approval is required, the office then administers the review process for either

board through the application process, to a public hearing and concluding with compliance to either of the boards' requirements and the permits being issued. During and after the physical development of the property, the Land Use Office is responsible for verifying permit compliance.

SOME RECENT POINTS OF INTEREST

- Wall Township's development regulations have recently been recodified and are available on the Internet at generalcode.com and wallnj.com. A copy may be purchased through the Wall Township Clerk's Office.
- The Planning Board meets the first and last Monday of each month.
- The Board of Adjustment meets the first and third Wednesday of each month.
- The Land Use Office issued 1,041 permits in 2003.
- As of the beginning of 2004, the Planning Board and Board of Adjustment have approved, but construction has not begun, 450 residential units and 787,000 square feet of non-residential space. Those figures do not include two new projects on Route 34 for 129,125 square feet of office space and 170,000 square feet of destination retail space.

The community relations/community alliance committee is an organization of volunteers that represent a broad cross section of the community. Our volunteers represent education, law enforcement, clergy, business and other organizations. The alliance coordinates, plans and conducts alcoholism, tobacco and drug abuse prevention activities. We have been working hard to bring programs to young people in our community as well as the adults. We think we have provided a good balance of prevention, health and wellness programs as we strive to combat substance abuse.

We sponsored a parent dialogue night, appropriately called "Not in My Town", last November. It was an opportunity for all elementary school parents in the district to discuss what drugs currently are popular, their effects and consequences. It was an informative and thought-provoking evening for all.

In September, the alliance worked with Dr. Tony Garrow to coordinate the 2nd Annual Kids Day America. Thanks to the many of the businesses in Wall Township Kids Day America once again was a successful health and prevention fair entirely for children. REMINDER

All township residents using the Recycling Center will be asked for proof of residency, i.e. driver's license, tax bill, etc.

All cardboard is to be flattened.

Household bulk and waste must be separated due to recycling handling.

Empty propane tanks may be recycled provided control valve is removed.

BULK PICK UP DAYS

Each area of the township will have one designated bulk pickup day on a Wednesday each month. This bulk pickup day will take place unless the date in question falls on a township holiday as above. Your bulk pickup week for your pickup zone is shown on the attached map and chart. On your designated bulk pickup day, the township will pickup household appliances. Also included is debris resulting from minor alterations to a private residence by the owner or tenant. This is not intended to include debris from alterations done by contractors. Place at curb prior to 5:30 AM on the day of your bulk pickup. As stated, bulk pickup will not be provided during holidays observed by the township.

It should be noted that the township does not provide curbside pickup of tires or cardboard or junk mail. The items must

be taken to the Atlantic Avenue Recycling Center. Please note there is no fee for disposal of cardboard at the Recycling Center. Tires may be disposed of at the Recycling Center located at Tiltens Corner Road for a small fee. A fee is charged due to the fact that the township must pay a premium to get ride of building materials (doors, windows, wood, paneling, etc.) and tires. DO NOT put materials out for bulk pickup until the Monday before your scheduled Wednesday pickup.

The purpose of household bulk pickup is for the convenience of Wall Township residents. All bulk items are picked up on a 10-item basis. Any questions regarding volume or quantity, please call the Department of Public Works, 732-449-2700, before items are placed at the curb.

REMINDER...

RECYCLABLES - Use 32-gallon trash cans. Proper labels must be used and have them facing the street. Do Not put out in plastic bags.

HOUSEHOLD TRASH - Use cans not exceeding 45-gallon capacity. Limit of 6 receptacles picked up at one time.

MEDICAL WASTE AND NEEDLES - Shall not be picked up. Contact Monmouth County Health Department.

Brush/Leaf Pickup Schedules

BRUSH

Brush will be picked up during your bulk/recycling pickup week. Please have brush out at the curb the weekend before your bulk week. DO NOT put it out any sooner.

(SEE MAP FOR YOUR ZONE)

ZONE 1 - FIRST WEEK OF THE MONTH - BULK WEEK

West Belmar area, Shark River Manor, north of 18th Ave. to east of New Bedford Road.

ZONE 2 - SECOND WEEK OF THE MONTH - BULK WEEK

West of New Bedford Road, north of 18th Ave., to township boundaries.

ZONE 3 - THIRD WEEK OF THE MONTH - BULK WEEK

East of Route 35, South of 18th Ave. to township boundaries.

ZONE 4 - FOURTH WEEK OF THE MONTH - BULK WEEK

South of 18th Ave., west of Route 35 to township boundaries.

Brush will be picked up during your bulk week February through October. The brush shall be a maximum length of 4 feet, placed at curbside in a neat and orderly fashion, *free from viney material and leaves. Ordinance 28-2001, 3.7-3 will be strictly enforced.

LEAVES

Leaves will be picked up with vacuum-type machines **November** through **December** during the **Fall Season**, **April 1** through **May 15** during the **Spring Season**. Leaves must be put at the curb neatly at the edge of the road NOT to be mixed with viney materials, twigs and evergreen prunings.

Do Not put the leaves in plastic bags as they will not be picked up.

GRASS

Grass clippings are accepted at the Tiltens Corner Road Recycling Center. There is NO pickup of grass.



Wall Library Still the Place To Go When You Want to Curl Up with a Good Book

Whether you are in search of resources for a classroom assignment, looking for a movie or good book to curl up with during the latest round of bad weather, or keeping up on current events around the world or in your community, the Wall Library is the place to find what you seek.

With your library card (green for adults, purple for children), you have access to a rich collection of fiction and non-fiction, including many books in large print, as well as reference materials, DVDs, CDs/audiocassettes and magazines. As a branch of the Monmouth County Library system, our catalog, called WebCat, reflects not only the Wall Library resources but also those of the ENTIRE Monmouth County Library System. In other words, if we don't have a particular title at Wall but it is owned by another branch, it can be requested and brought to Wall Library for you.

The Monmouth County Library System's Homepage www.monmouth.lib.nj.us offers access to the WebCat from home. From WebCat you can find out what titles we have and if they are currently

checked-out. A particularly wonderful feature is "user services." By clicking on the blue rectangle, you can renew titles online and check the status of titles on request. Of course, you can always call us or come to the library.

Besides the WebCat, the homepage is an incredibly rich site that provides library cardholders access to computer-based subscription resources over a wide spectrum of topics. If you need to search for magazine articles, newspaper articles, articles in Spanish, reference information, it is there for you. For the fiction lover, the homepage offers NovelList, which can assist you in selecting titles in a variety of ways.

The homepage also includes links to search engines and directories as well as county and state resources. Many of these resources are available to you from the comfort of your own home if you have access to the Internet.

The Wall Library currently has four public access Internet terminals from which you can conduct research or just "surf." New for 2004, all branch and member

libraries have links to the New York Times Archives (1851-2001), the Wall Street Journal (1984-present), Hoovers Business Information, and HeritageQuest Online (including digital census records, cemetery lists, church, school and court records and much more.)

Despite the focus on accessibility through new technology, we are no less devoted to paper. We have a wide variety of reference materials for a project or school paper as well as resources to guide you in your search for a good read.

SUMMER READING PROGRAM

During the summer, the Monmouth County Library System sponsors a Summer Reading Program at many of its branches. The Program is divided into two reading clubs: the Read-to-Me Club and the Vacation Reading Club.

The Wall Read-to-Me Club is for children going into kindergarten and first grade who are not quite reading. The Vacation Reading Club is for children who are already reading. Both are loosely structured, theme-oriented clubs for which children register at the beginning of the summer. Each child is asked to come into the library on a regular basis during normal library hours

to report the books they have read and to make new choices. Children are encouraged not only to pursue their current interests but also to broaden them. Aside from experiencing the joy of reading, the children are developing good reading habits, polishing their reading skills and learning what their hometown public library can provide for them. Throughout the summer, prizes will be awarded to each reader as they reach certain milestones. To celebrate reaching their reading goals, the library will host parties for both clubs at the end of the summer program.

Parents and teachers report that library reading programs have encouraged many children on the road to reading. Children who have difficulty reading or who are not reading at the beginning of the summer often are reading with ease and enjoyment by the end of the summer.

WTEAC Sets 2004 Goals

The Wall Township Environmental Advisory Committee assists in the protection, development, and preservation of natural resources, include open space, air, land, and water; provides environmental education and disseminates educational information to the community through projects and activities.



- Providing more nature walks for the public this spring along the Manasquan River, Wreck Pond and the Shark River watersheds;
- Making the preliminary trail markings for a newly self-guided nature walk at Community Park.

Other goals include updating its educational literature, review site plans, take environmental videos, write news articles and provide workshops for the community. In addition, we will continue to make recommendations on environmental concerns or issues as needed.

We welcome you to join us in exploring the many and diversified natural resources that make Wall Township unique.

This year's goals include~

- Sponsoring essay, poetry and poster competitions throughout the Wall Township schools with exhibits of the winning essays and poems at the Wall Library;
- Becoming more involved on the open space initiative, mandated storm water regulations and with Wreck Pond;

Allenwood Park Demonstration Garden

The environmental advisory committee received a matching DEP grant for \$3,700 in December for an educational native garden project along the bike trail at Allenwood Park (in the Area 12 Watershed). The township will dedicate the Allenwood Park Native Demonstration Garden this spring.

Professional landscaper Rich Pillar from the Wild Earth Native Plant Nursery recommended 71 varieties of native plants - a total of 347 plants altogether. Members of the Wall High School Environmental Club helped the WTEAC with the plantings while the Wall High School ROTC mulched the entire area. We received a donation of stones for the paths in the garden.

The environmental advisory committee used some of the grant money to publish 3,000 of its educational native landscaping project booklet on the Allenwood Park Demonstration Garden, *As Easy as Your ABC's - Landscaping Techniques*, to help educate Wall residents and people from surrounding communities in the alternative landscaping techniques that can reduce non-point source pollution to our environment. The booklet also discusses integrated pest management.

The WTEAC also hopes to expand on this project by adding three park benches, a kiosk, and permanent lighting at the base of the flag.

Wall **EXPANDS** Route 18 Bike Path

The state recently approved plans to expand Wall Township's Route 18 bike path and will fund part of the work.

The plans call for an extension from the existing bike path located at the Township Municipal Complex on Allaire Road to the existing Edgar Felix Bike Path located south of and parallel to Atlantic Avenue. The proposed bike path will be a minimum of 8 feet wide and, where conditions permit, the path will be widened to 10 feet.

The project is the first phase of a multi-phase plan to install a bike path within the Route 18 right-of-way south of State Route 138. The bike path will connect Eighteenth Avenue to Lakewood Road while intersecting with the existing Edgar Felix Bike Path, which is part of a regional bike path intended to connect Trenton to the Shore.

Once this phase is completed, a safe continuous bike path will extend from the Municipal Complex to the existing bike path system within the township. Plans for the project are currently in the design phase.

*Creating New Resources in Wall Public Schools
School Resource Officers Bring Higher Level of Safety & Communications*

Students attending Wall High School and Wall Intermediate School may have noticed a new authority walking the halls. As of January 5, 2004, the Wall Township Police Department and the Wall Township School District have teamed up to provide a safer learning environment for children in the township.

A partnership between the school system and Police Department is not a new concept in Wall Township but this program certainly brings that relationship to a new level. The School Resource Officers provide a much-needed direct tie between these two organizations.

Funded with a grant obtained from the U.S. Department of Justice, Ptl. Michael Textor and Ptl. Michael Tozer have been appointed School Resource Officers and now have permanent offices in Wall High School and Wall Intermediate School.

They also visit the elementary schools on a regular basis.

The grant has provided the funding to train the new School Resource Officers as well as allowed the Police Department to hire two new officers to replace Ptls. Textor and Tozer in the patrol division.

It is hoped that the presence of these officers in the schools will encourage communication between law enforcement and everyone in the school community.

Ptls. Textor and Tozer provide multiple services to the school system in order to achieve this goal. Their responsibilities include maintaining and controlling traffic at the start and end of school to provide safe access; coordinating training and educational programs for the student bodies; providing a resource for both students and parents to address all types of concerns; serving as advisors to the principal as needed and acting as a liaison between the schools and law enforcement officials.

As Chief of Police Roy Hall stated, "The School Resource Officers coupled with our DARE Officers, Patrol Officers and Juvenile Officers, allow us to provide for the public safety needs of both the schools and general community."

Both the Police Department and school district are excited about the opportunities that will continue to result from the program.
